This week we received the fantastic news that our recordbreaking exam results have placed our school within the top 100 schools according to The Times Good School Guide 2023 this week. This 90<sup>th</sup> place is testament to the hard



work of pupils and teachers alike with support of our continued dedicated parents.

We stand out further within the Southwest region, being ranked as 7<sup>th</sup> locally amongst the state and grammar schools.

#### **NEW LIBRARY**

Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> December 2022 was a special day for students and staff at TGGS as we celebrated the formal opening of the school library. The project to create a brand-new school library has been led by the TGGS Student Council with representatives from students in all year groups supported by the Head of English, Mrs Jo Preston and the newly appointed librarian, Mrs Rebehah Reed.

After months of planning from the student body – including designing a layout for the new library, fundraising for new books, furniture, and digital devices – culminated in the grand opening event, when all the hard work really paid off!

Local artist Becky Bettesworth judged student entries to a competition to design a book cover for your favourite book; Year 7 student Emma Carroll was chosen as the winner. Becky then led a question-and-answer session with students and provided invaluable advice about finding your passion in life and maintaining a resilient attitude when challenges are presented. Becky also donated one of her paintings – Dream Big to be displayed in the library to remind all our students to be aspirational and have self-belief that they can achieve their goals in life.

The opening of the library was commemorated with a Christmas tree of knowledge which was planted by the youngest student in our school, Eleanor Mills in 7J. The tree will be a symbol of growth as it will age with our students and school community, whilst reflecting the school's commitment to its eco-friendly vision.

The ribbon was then cut to officially open the library and students and staff were invited to visit the library, eat minced pies, whilst listening to a selection of festive carols performed by our wonderfully talented school choir and Year 11 pianist Mattie Thomas.

The second game was against Maynard which was tougher but TGGS won 8-5 and there was some excellent movement inside the D. The next game was against Chumleigh and was a 9-3 win with some good feeding and elevation and excellent movement throughout the court. Passes were accurate with everyone driving into spaces. TGGS won 21-1.

TGGS were now into the final where they met Newton Abbot College. The team worked hard and there were lots of great interceptions, but we fought hard and managed to come out on top winning 17-11 which means TGGS are **DEVON NETBALL CHAMPIONS**. The U16's will represent Devon in the Southwest Regional Netball Tournament in January.

# **CHARITY WEEK GENEROURISTY**

What a fantastic effort from our creative, enthusiastic, and hardworking students during TGGS Charity Week! Each House spent a lunchtime selling scrumptious homemade cakes, handcrafted accessories, second-hand books and clothes, hand painted paperweights and bookmarks, seeds for planting flowers, pom-pom topped pencils, lucky dips, freshly made smoothies, waffles, pancakes and other edible treats! Putting into practice our TGGS school values of kindness, equality, and collaboration our students and sixth formers raised a grand total of £2,450.02 which will be shared across their chosen charities: Blue Cross (Beal House), Make-A-Wish (Cross House), Cancer Research (Jackson House), Surfers Against Sewage (Robertson House) and Water Aid (Wilkinson House). Well done everyone!

#### **POLITICS ENRICHMENT**

Politics students have been very busy this autumn and have benefitted from engaging with a number of local MPs. On 21<sup>st</sup> October the Year 12 Politics students visited Exeter University for a workshop with Ben Bradshaw, the Labour MP for Exeter and former Cabinet Minister. He gave a fascinating insight into current Politics and his view of the Labour Party's prospects at the next election, and also wowed some of our international students by engaging with them in fluent Italian.

By contrast on 4<sup>th</sup> November 50 students welcomed Anne Marie Morris, the Conservative MP for Newton Abbot, whose talk focused on the constituency role of an MP and how this can be in tension with their party loyalty – a tension which in her case saw her kicked out of the Conservative Party for several months earlier this year. Both talks featured lively question and answer sessions and following the spring visits by Anthony Mangnall the Totnes MP and Torbay's own MP Kevin Foster mean that we will have heard from the elected representatives for nearly all the student body. By the time you read this, we will also have had a Zoom meeting with Luke Pollard, the Plymouth MP and Labour Armed Forces spokesperson. Our speaker list for later this year includes a Greenpeace representative, the Lib Dem leader of

Greenpeace representative, the Lib Dem leader of Torbay Council, the Duke of Somerset about his role as a crossbench peer in the House of Lords, and York University's Dr Eva Heims.



#### **BECOMING A BARRISTER**

It was great to welcome Bethany Burnard back to TGGS. After finishing her A level studies with us in 2015, Bethany studied Law at university and then went to Bar School to become an advocate. She has just completed her pupillage and became a fully qualified Barrister this October working out of KBG Chambers in Plymouth where she specialises in Family Law. The lecture was attended by 70 parents and students. This will be incredibly useful for those studying Geology or Geography (or who intend to do so in the future), or indeed, anyone wanting to understand how science works.

# **CAROL SERVICE**

On the Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> December, at St. John's church in Torquay, the extra-curricular musical groups joined forces to present a traditional Christmas Carol service. The choir sung favourites such as O Holy Night and John Rutter's Angels' Carol, the year 7 choir sang and produced a Nativity scene with numbers from the musical of the same name, the orchestra played a medley of carols and 'We're Walking in the Air', whilst the string orchestra gave a moving performance of Carol of the Bells. A few new groups were introduced including Flute Choir, Guitar and Ukulele club, Hand Bells and Staff Choir who each performed respectively: Dance of the Sugar Plum Fairy, Have Yourself a Merry Little Christmas, a Jingle Bells medley, and White Christmas. #### **ROME TRIP**

Over the weekend, the Religious Studies Department took 36 students to the bustling streets of Rome. We spent the first evening taking in the beauty of the Spanish Steps.

On the Saturday we set off to explore the Vatican City- the smallest country in the world! Our guide, Sonia, led us through the Vatican Museum and gave us the opportunity to experience the elegance of the Sistine Chapel. We then visited St. Peter's Basilica, which gave us students an in-depth understanding of the history of the Catholic faith. In the afternoon, we headed to the Pantheon to nurture our knowledge of the artist Raphael. After a dinner of Carbonara, we threw a coin into the Trevi fountain while enjoying a traditional gelato!

The next day we learnt about the brutal history of the Colosseum. We then ventured to the Vittorio Emmanuel, known by the locals as the 'wedding cake' of Rome, due to its fancy marble façade. After scaling the building via glass elevator and looking down on Rome, we looked around the Manertime Prison, learning how the justice system has evolved through time.

In the evening, we had a Kosher dinner at a Jewish restaurant located in the historical Jewish Ghetto. This supported our Judaism studies.



On our final day, we visited the Scala Sancta (Holy steps), developing our understanding of the devotion of many Christians. We also visited the catacombs where thousands of Christians were buried up to the 4th century. After a couple more Churches, we headed home, tired but with many happy memories.

## IT'S ALL IN THE PREPARATION

This term has also seen a record number of early applicants to university from Year 13-17 students applying for Medicine, Dentistry or Veterinary Science, and 19 students applying for Oxford or Cambridge courses.
